

The Church of St John's Waterloo is located at the very heart of London, beside Waterloo Station. Destroyed by a wartime bomb in 1941, it was rebuilt as the celebratory 'Festival of Britain' church and re-opened in May 1951. To mark its 60th anniversary, a 5 year Festival of Arts & Ideas was launched in 2011. Now in its second year, the Waterloo Festival returns to celebrate the area of Waterloo and its rich diversity past and present, this time with the theme of 'War and Peace'.

From Thursday 12 July until Tuesday 17 July 2012, St John's Waterloo, its Crypt and churchyard are hosting a great many events. The inspiring programme includes classical music with World and European première performances, guided walks around Waterloo, theatre based on local remembrances from WWII, a community fête, workshops open to all and involving local schools, a tea dance and much more. Catering for all ages, the Festival encompasses the local community as well as a wider world audience.
